#### SAMUEL MORSE RIDES AGAIN

On May 24<sup>th</sup> 1844, in a demonstration witnessed by members of Congress, Samuel FB Morse sent a telegraph message from the US Capitol to Alfred Vail at a railroad station in Baltimore. The message was "What Hath God Wrought". Taken from Numbers 23:23, the phrase was suggested to Morse by Annie Ellsworth, young daughter of a friend. That message referred to the leap in technology which was about to change the world as they knew it in 1844. The same phrase can be applied to our current pandemic, in 2020.

Fact is, we are not sure what is being wrought around us as I write, and as you (hopefully) read this. We do know that a new corona virus is among us --COVID-19. COVID-19 is a cousin of the SARS virus and 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin twice-removed from the good old Flu (H1N1), MERS, and Ebola. And it is among us – with a vengeance. Charles Darwin said organisms when faced with change have three choices – Adapt, Migrate or Die. I prefer Adapt. #### **NET ETIQUETTE IN THE COVID-19 ERA: and BEYOND**


With the increased presence of Net traffic during the COVID-19 Era, a reminder of how we should be comporting ourselves when checking into a net, might be timely. As Net check-ins can rise to over 20 hams at times, to speak for 3 minutes each = 60 minutes.

Check-ins who are number 18 and 19, accordingly, would have to wait close to an hour to speak. Please bear this in mind when you join one of the many Nets we now have, or those now substituting for face-to-face meetings. Also, NCS folks should remember to keep their comments crisp and succinct so that others can have time to speak. The following excerpt of a larger article on Repeater Etiquette (written by Dave K2DBK), may be familiar to some members, however, it is worth repeating. With larger check-ins we must be time-aware to ensure that all who participate will be able to speak. So please, keep your comments short.

The 3-minute timeout

- Our repeaters normally have a 3 minute "timeout" setting. The 3 minute length is meant as a maximum length, not a suggested length.
- It's considered good etiquette to keep your transmission length shorter than this, especially if there are a lot of people in a QSO, or during busy times on the repeater.
- If you exceed the 3 minute limit, the repeater controller will cut off your transmission, and when you unkey, you'll hear a message from the controller letting you know that you have timed out the repeater.
- The controller timer resets <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of a second after the transmitting station stops transmitting, so
- "quick keying" will mean that the length of your transmission is added on to the length of the previous transmission. In other words, if the person just previous to you speaks for 2 minutes and 45 seconds, at 16 seconds into your transmission you'll get cut off. This is to encourage users to leave a gap between transmissions.
- Intentionally dropping your carrier just long enough to allow the time-out timer to reset is considered extremely rude, since you are then monopolizing the repeater



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# Video teleconferencing by KB1JL

MARC gas been forced to adapt video teleconferencing due to the stay at home voluntary quarantine, and town/state restrictions on gatherings of more than 5 people. Many business and organizations, churches, and government agencies have jumped aboard the video bandwagon. There are many choices out there, Zoom, Jitsi, Google Hangouts, Cisco webx, MS teams, Skype and others in addition to one on one apps like Facetime, Duo and others. Video conferencing is a great way to stay in touch with friends and family.

After some research and experimentation, MARC has chosen the Jitsi platform. It is free, open source, versatile, and seems to do all the things the other options do. Jitsi has been around source 2003 and is an open source non profit project, No one will datamine your participation and sell that data. Zoom has been mentioned as an alternative, but its sudden popularity has exposed many issues and vulnerabilities, which are currently being addressed now by Zoom staff. More on Jitsi here: https://jitsi.org/jitsi-meet/

The Jitsi Meet conference can be accessed with any device with a web cam, microphone and WebRTC capable browser. This includes most laptops, tablets, and cellphones these days. If you have a camera for your desktop PC, use it. If you dont have a camera, you can still join the room with audio only or dial in by phone. There is a provision to turn on/off your camera and your microphone at any time during the meeting. There are no time limits to Jitsi meetings.

A few things about operation. Good lighting helps provide a good video feed. Lighting should be in front of operator or to one or both sides (3 point). An environment free of ambient background noise is best, and will not be distracting to other participants. Wear headphone, earphones or earbuds if you can. Gaming headsets are ideal. This prevents feedback head by others if you have your speakers too loud,

Dialing in by phone to the posted phone number and room code does work, but it may take 2 or 3 tries to get in. The club room will be password protected. Jltsi does have apps for android and iOS, but all you need to do is paste the link into your browser. Chrome is preferred but others work.

The link and password will go out via the club reflector before the meeting. We recommend trying the link it before the Thursday meeting. Go to the side, enter a random generated room or create your own room name. Make sure your video cam and audio microphone works. You will need to give Jitsi permission to access it. Look at the controls on your screen.

Bottom left: Screen share, raise your hand, chat

Bottom center Microphone on/off, Leave meeting (red), camera on/off

Bottom right: Toggle tile view, room link info, more actions. One the 3 dots (bottom right) is to enter your name and/or callsign, to be seen by other participants. Hover over any screen icon and it will provide more info.

This is a very basic instruction article. More info available at the Jitsi website and the club officers can help with any questions. We have been using this for a month now, and it seems to do the job. We also have the capacity to stream the meetings on Youtube.

All of the social restrictions imposed due to the pandemic have left us with a lot of hams who have time on their hands. As one might expect, this can lead to building antennas and searching for hidden transmitters. About a dozen local amateurs, and quite a few XYLs, got involved in Fox Hunting in the past few weeks. You will probably recognize a lot of these hams in the photos.

The two Fox Hunts, held on consecutive Saturdays, allowed for only individual participants and teams made up of close family members. Each participant hunted independently and maintained a 2 meter separation from everyone else at all times. That only makes sense considering that the Fox was transmitting on frequencies in the 2 meter band.

The first hunt involved four square miles of search area and gave us all some practice under relatively easy conditions. The second hunt covered eight square miles and the Fox (me) thought that six transmitters and six antennas might be just what was needed. Except for a few minutes of unexpected technical difficulty with one of the transmitters, the hunters had lots of signals to work with.

Unfortunately, with the social distancing rules in effect, it's not too easy for anyone to just tag along on a hunt and learn some of the art of direction finding. But, if anyone wants to join a future hunt, you can be successful with some minimal equipment. KB1JL and WB1GYZ have both been consistent top place finishers and have not used elaborate equipment. However, I am now beginning to suspect that they are both Jedi's.

I hope that we local hams have more of these hunts and that some more hams join us. When things return to normal, I expect we'll have some official, club sponsored Fox Hunts as well.

#### HOW TO CATCH A FOX (without really trying).

Being new to foxhunting and not having had much time to test my antenna, I decided that the best way to proceed was to start in the middle of the circle thus cutting my search area down to a 2 mile radius. I arrived there about 14 minutes before the 11AM start time only to find Dave (the fox) at the side of the road! He was afraid that some of the participants wouldn't receive any signal at all if too far out so he moved to the center.

In order to salvage the morning I set out to distance myself from the area and use it as an opportunity to test my antenna in the field. I went from getting a good signal/good direction to nothing at all (although that may have been during the low power transmission).

Meeting back at Choate while maintaining social distancing, we all checked in and are looking forward to doing this again. Thanks to Dave, NZ1J, for giving us this release from cabin fever in these trying times!

**BART TOFTNESS N1BRL** 

Bart Toftness N1BRL, (formerly KA1EOX novice call 1978) was a CB'er until discovering ham radio. Due to work and family commitments he put his new radio hobby on hold until he could devote more time.

In the interim Bart became interested in growing pumpkins...not ordinary backyard variety, but really big gourds. He once grew a competition pumpkin weighing 1539 pounds. Such a huge plant requires an area of 750 square feet or about 24 x 30 plot, so he is limited to two on his residential lot. Ideally, a single plant requires 1,000 square feet. He starts seeds indoors on April 15<sup>th</sup> and after two weeks transplants them outdoors to electrically warmed soil inside protective structures.

Competition pumpkins require daily feeding, watering, and many hours of maintenance. In June growers carefully transfer pollen from select plants "because pumpkins aren't very promiscuous." He says that doing so ensures selective traits for next year's crop. Bart quips that he knows growers who got so competitive that they sold their home and relocated to a better growing locale. He has also attended auctions where a highly sought single seed sold for eighteen-hundred dollars, though typically, good seed can be had for much less. Bart likes doing things in a big way and continued doing so until an injury precluded heavy lifting. That change of circumstance brought him full circle to where he left off with ham radio, and as luck would have it, inherited his fathers Collins 32V1 transmitter and complementary receiver.

Soon after, he received an invitation from MARC, joined the club, upgraded to Extra and celebrated by clearing a space on his desk to accommodate a Kenwood 590SG. Bart enjoys working weak-signal mode FT-8 in the absence of good band conditions. It took him only 9 months to work all states and DXCC using FT-8. He also enjoys SSB and has recently decided to learn CW.

Bart was an associate of research for 45 years at Yale School of Medicine. He worked with radio isotopes doing cancer research, the department of physiology where he was involved with red blood cell membrane potentials, and did cataract lab experiments in the department of ophthalmology. While still at Yale, he ran the epilepsy research lab for the VA, finally retiring in 2012.
