The President's Net Control Corner

HOSTING A NEW W1KKF TRAINING/EDUCATIONAL NET - A Plan for Outreach

The complaint most often heard from new hams is "I have my license, but I do not know how to get on the Air". This concern is also expressed by the ARRL and other Amateur Radio groups. Truth is, that many Hams once they have received their new ticket, never get on the air. They lose interest and their license languishes in a drawer until it expires – a missed opportunity indeed. It seems to me that since the MARC Repeater W1KKF is underutilized and often is just sitting there waiting to be of assistance, it presents a golden opportunity for W1NRG to address this issue and better utilize this valuable resource. I am not attempting to 'boil the ocean', but maybe we can boil just our part of it, here in Wallingford.

The W1KKF repeater is used formally on Tuesday - one day a week - with Todd K1TDO as the NCS for his half hour 1930-2000 ET Net. If one listens to the 147.36 MHz frequency other times and on other days, – occasionally one hears some conversations, but generally the frequency/repeater is quiet. I propose that W1NRG (MARC) consider using the W1KKF repeater as a home for a new MARC Net to be named: The **MARC Training/Educational Net**.

I envision this Net as a closed net operating with a formal NCS for either 30-60 minutes a week. The NCS position would/should rotate among club members. <u>Time would be 1930 – 2000 or 2030 ET</u>. I believe the <u>best day of the week for the Net would be Wednesday</u>. This time/day choice would avoid interfering with other OnAir nets and activities including Nets for K1TDO, SKYWARN, Yale W1YU, N1ZN, K1VDF, WesCon/Nutmeg NTS, as well as MARC Business and Activity Meetings.

The Net's Agenda should cover of a range of practical How-To topics and activities and could include:

- Practice and training for new hams wishing to get OnAir and overcome 'mike fright'
- Practice and training for Hams wishing to become a Net Control Operator
- Review of SKYWARN Net OPS
- Review and explanation of questions/answers from FCC License exams
- Discussion of various Amateur Radio topics- antennas, contesting, digital modes, etc.
- Review of traffic handling and how to pass messages
- CW code practice sessions
- Review of VE exam guestions
- How to plan, set-up, run, and participate in a Fox Hunt
- Review of OEM or CERT issues
- Review of how one manages communication OPS coverage for a road race or other event

The activities/topics **NOT COVERED OR ALLOWED** would be rag chewing, information about one's day or their pet's habits, their gardens, their visiting relatives or other personal/medical/health issues. It would be up to the NCS and the Net Manager to monitor the On Air content.

This Net would need to be part of, and held in conjunction with, an active club recruitment effort and could, as I envision it, incorporate members from other amateur radio clubs in the area, who can access the W1KKF repeater.

Of course, I have formed a Committee to address these issues and report back to the MARC membership after they have a clearer idea of whether such a new Net is feasible, desirable, sustainable and useful. Current Committee Members are: Rob K1RCT; John N1GNV; Frank N1OKR; Ed N1YLN and W1YSM (*ex officio*). Others are welcome to join – just let me know if interested. One person should act as Net Manager who would ensure ongoing NCS coverage, help choose content and in general, manage the Net.

A MARC Training/Educational Net would improve our visibility and leadership in the State and among other Amateur Radio clubs as well as the ARRL. I think it is a topic worthy of consideration. I would be happy to take a turn as NCS. Again, it needs to be in conjunction with other MARC out-reach activities such as recruiting new entry-level hams who would want to get OnAlr, etc. Also, it could provide a model for other clubs.

I am sure the nature, range of topics and quality of net content will improve over time as this Net evolves. We will discuss this proposal at an upcoming Business Meeting. I will be addressing a number of other MARC-expanding initiatives moving forward. This one is exciting to me as it gets MARC OnAir, will provide an opportunity for multiple MARC members to participate, and perhaps will provide other groups a template for improving their Clubs' activities, or join ours.

As always, let me know your thoughts.

Secretary's Report:

The June Business Meeting minutes were published in the July Key Klix and were accepted.

The club replied to an inquiry from a prospective member via email.

Treasurer's Report:

K1WJL presented the Treasurer's Report, which was accepted.

Station Manager's Report:

The Dune Star repair will cost \$43.55

Club members worked as the K2D Thirteen Colonies Special Event Station and logged 4423 QSOs.

Activity Committee:

The July Activity Meeting will be Lark in the Park.

Saturday Mornings: Twenty people visited the club last Saturday morning.

Station Activations: We earned more than 2700 points on Field Day.

The 10-10 contest is the 3rd and 4th of August. W/VE Islands is August 24th and 25th.

<u>Nets:</u> K1VDF's 10 meter net, N1ZN's 6 meter net, and K1TDO's 2 meter net continue to get between 4 and 14 check-ins each week. The Nutmeg Net is currently on the 147.36 repeater four nights per week.

Castle Craig: The summer 10-10 SSB QSO Party will be the first weekend in August.

Scholarship: The annual scholarship was awarded last month.

Membership: We have 76 members paid through the end of 2019. We're working on a letter to send to prospective new members.

Interference and Technical: There have been several reports of interference caused by LED bulbs.

VE and Instruction: Exam sessions are scheduled for July 13 and September 14.

Nutfest: The Nutmeg Hamfest is planned for October 13 at the Sheraton Four Points.

Four speakers are scheduled and there will be a VE session.

WARG Committee update from KC1SA

Trying to put together an 'ice breaker' for this Key Klix column brought to mind perhaps not everyone knows how the WARG Committee formed or what WARG is all about.

Chris Sievert, WA1VXH (SK), was the Wallingford EC (Emergency Coordinator) in the 2016 time frame which is about the time MARC was moving from one firehouse to another. Chris had lots of contacts with local police and fire department due to his work at Motorola which benefitted our organization through the years. When MARC moved from Cook Hill to our current OEM location, Wallingford Emergency Management personnel asked Chris 'what can your organization (MARC) do to aid Wallingford'. Chris referred to this as MARC 'paying rent' or being 'good tenants' while we are using the OEM building. The idea of how can we help Wallingford and surrounding towns morphed into what is now the WARG Committee.

WARG is a standing Committee within the Meriden Amateur Radio Club (MARC). Below is the current ORG chart which shows the communication paths from Town Officials into WARG/MARC. WARG workings more or less follow Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) type structure. The group goal is to meet four times per year with town Emergency Management for planning purposes and once or twice per year for drills. In the event of an emergency, Wallingford Emergency Management would activate our group to provide communication assistance. The structure of activation, providing assistance during an event, and closing down operations after an event, is all outlined by the FEMA ICS documents.

You've probably seen my emails asking for more MARC members to be part of the WARG committee. We are going to need help. During the Wallingford 350th Jubilee celebration the WARG group will be activated to provide communication assistance and we'll need about 16 people manning stations in the town. If you're interested in joining the team, start by beginning the ICS training journey. This link gives a good background on ICS and where to go to start the training;


SATURDAY MORNINGS AT THE EOC




The 6 Meter .3 element was beam installed at the Firehouse Saturday. Very flat across the band, less than 2.0 SWR without tuning 50.1 to 54.0 MHz.

It is connected to the FT-991a on the VHF North Station (nearest the window). 100W on 6M. Connected through the grounding system with a polyphaser in-line. It will be connected to the VHF-PC for rig control and logging as well as (eventually) transmission recording for EOC use.

I am planning an orientation meeting soon with all of the Station Improvements and new operating conditions. FYI we also are now sharing the LP between both HF Stations. There is an A/B Switch mounted on the wall.

Each Station must use the manual Tuner Antenna Selection Switch AND the manual tuning system. No more internal tuner use for either HF Station. There will be a block diagram near the Tuners soon explaining how to use the gear.



Ten-Tec: Antenna port #2 is the Fan Dipole. Drake: Antenna port #2 is the G5RV.

Tennadyne T6 L.P., is connected to each Tuner on Antenna port #1 via an A/B Switch.

Either station may use the T6 by selecting Antenna Port #1 on THAT Tuners Antenna Selector.

You must also select the correct Station on the A/B Switch. The T6 may not need manual tuning.

Select the correct Band on each Tuner in-use! Consult the tuning chart for each Tuner in-use!

Use low power while manually tuning, 5W maximum! Observe SWR as you tune around.

!> Failure to adhere to this could damage a Transceiver <!

Attached are pix of K1LYP in action, erecting the 6 meter beam at the firehouse Saturday morning. Rob was supervising and he and Ed, N1YLN brought the coax into the shack and hooked it up to the VHF station... Installation was successful with QSOs with club members N1ZN, W1DQ, and KR1U, 55 miles away in the northeast corner of CT.







K1TDO TODD OLSEN



K1TDO Todd David Olsen, was born 1969 in New Haven, CT. From an early age he developed a penchant for learning computers and associated devices. He credits his father, an electrical engineer, for opening the world of electronics to him. He was 15 when he got his first computer, a tape driven Commodore 64 with 300 baud modem. From computer BBS Todd went on to packet radio and then to various ham radio modes.

He was first licensed as KA1WYH in 1990 and steadily progressed to where he now holds the esteemed Extra class radio license. His early radio equipment consisted of a Kenwood TS-430, manual tuner, and G5RV antenna, which was later upgraded to a Yaesu FT-450D and an LDG AT-200 Pro II automatic antenna tuner. His present antenna is a Rocket 88.


Todd has 30 years experience in Karate, a martial art he feels has kept him grounded and disciplined. He holds a 2nd degree black belt in Tang Soo Do, and a 1st degree black belt in Rossi Kun Tao International, both earned under the same master, Eric Breur. Todd has found that practitioners of martial arts come to realize that the body follows the mind, and that there is no enlightenment beyond self.

In 2012 MARC voted Todd "Ham of the Year." He enjoys MARC's yearly Field Day and is also Net Control for the 147.360 two-meter net which meets every Tuesday at 7:30pm. He is also Net Control for the KB1AEV linked repeater, two-meter SARA net on Wednesday at 8:45pm.

In 2003 Todd teamed up with Bob Carruthers, KB1FYL, to form the musical duo called "Bob Cat and the Night Owl" a country/folk/blues genre; or what Bob calls a salty taste of the blues. They rank #1 on the Southington reverb-nation chart, and got a Garage Band 3 star rating for "Bustin' My A.." They can also be heard on KIAC internet radio.

Todd is also a certified audio engineer with ProTools recording software and operates his own recording studio. He has also launched a private label studio for musicians and records under Silent Flute Production Company.

Todd prefers SSB operating and has 24 countries confirmed and 22 states, so far. He primarily operates 20 and 40 meters.
