Upcoming W1NRG Amateur Radio Events and Opportunities

Just like the TV ads, the Meriden Amateur Radio Club/Wallingford Amateur Radio group, keeps growing. growing, growing. Not just in size and membership but also in activity and opportunities. This year we are 75 years young. Despite our age, we are guite active. Indeed, there are two special activities coming up – The 75th Anniversary Gala and an opportunity to apply for and hopefully receive, an ARRL Club Development Grant.

First, is the 75th Anniversary Gala which will be held on Thursday evening June 23rd at the OEM on Hope Hill Road, from 6:00p - 8:30p. It will be a semi-formal event with many local Wallingford Town and ARRL dignitaries attending. The main purpose of the event is for W1NRG to receive a plaque from the ARRL leadership, honoring our 75 years of ARRL-Affiliated Club membership. This recognition was approved and bestowed by the ARRL Board of Directors and will be presented by the ARRL New England Division Director Fred Kemmerer (AB1OC). The text of the ARRL citation is listed elsewhere in this issue of Key Klix. Also invited are the ARRL CEO David Minster NA2AA, NE Division Vice-Director, Phil Temples (K9HI), and ARRL Field Service Manager Mike Walters W8ZY. Multiple Wallingford Town Leaders are also invited, including Mayor William W. Dickinson, Jr, Fire Chief Joseph Czentnar, and Police Chief John Ventura. Many additional Wallingford Town officials are slated to be present for the ceremonies which start promptly at 1900 (7:00p). We will also have a presentation of a plaque naming the William "Bill" Wawrzeniak (W1KKF SK) W1NRG Memorial CW Station.

There will be a buffet featuring appetizers, desserts, and non-alcoholic beverages. There is no charge for members or their guest. Indeed, all members are encouraged to attend the 75th Gala. I believe this event will help strengthen the ties between MARC/WARG and the Town of Wallingford and the ARRL. This event will represent another milestone in our cooperation and integration with the Town of Wallingford which has been so supportive of our Club and its activities. The Media also has been invited. Attire is what one would expect for such a gathering (no baseball caps or tee shirts, please). Second is the planned MARC application to the ARRL to receive a grant to fund a plan to expand our Club's amateur radio outreach in Connecticut. The ARRL has secured a \$500,000 grant from ARDC and has opened a competition for all amateur radio clubs to vie for the dollars. There are three (3) levels of awards to be offered, ~\$2,000, ~\$8,000 and ~\$25,000, categories. Our planned submission, currently named 'MARCONI', is our bid to apply for some of the ARRL monies being made available. The MARCONI Project is designed to enhance W1NRG MARC/WARG Club growth, development and outreach. Using our Club's leadership abilities, our Program is designed to focus on what activities we are already doing as the Meriden Amateur Radio Club. MARCONI is an acronym which stands for Motivating Amateur Radio Clubs to Open New Initiatives. There are six areas of interest for the MARC grant: POTA, Fox Hunts, CW training, Satellite Contacting, License and VE activities, and a Served Agencies section that includes SKYWARN, ARES, OEM, CERT and MRC activities. MARC will submit a proposal in the \$8,000-\$10,000 range to purchase equipment needed to promote these six areas of Club activity. By expanding our current activities, and developing a robust outreach initiative, we can best sustain these programs/activities, offering to mentor and export these activities to new hams, future hams, high school and college students and other clubs in our state -- possibly even nationally. Each area will have a leader. The leaders for these categories have been identified and asked if they would take on the task, and each has agreed.

Elmer "Skip" Norman Paquette (75) passed away peacefully on Friday, April 15, 2022 at Yale New Haven Hospital. He was the loving husband to Julie Elizabeth (Campbell) Paquette for the past 53 years. He was born on August 1, 1946 at Norwich Hospital to the late Elmer

Joseph and Margaret (Dam) Paquette. He is the eldest of 4 brothers and 1 sister. He graduated from Norwich Vocational Technical High School in 1965 where he specialized in carpentry. Later in life, he attended Capitol Community College and obtained an Associ-

ate's Degree in Computer Aided Drafting. Upon his degree being conferred, he started SP Drafting and Design. In 1965, he was drafted into the Vietnam War. He spent his military service in the Army. Throughout his years in the military, he served in the Special Forces Green Beret in various areas of the Pacific including Korea and Vietnam. He was a sharpshooter and a part of the 101st Airborne. He received several military honors Good Conduct Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal Ribbon, Army Presidential Unit Citation. He was also a Purple Heart Recipient. He was Honorably discharged from the military in 1969 due to an injury. He worked at Corometrics Medical Systems in Wallingford when he was first married. Then, he worked at the Veteran's Affair Hospital in West Haven where he was the supervisor of grounds for approximately 15 years. MARC FOX HUNTING IS ALIVE & WELL

I've been waiting for the weather to warm up so that I could go out foxhunting again. Today, May 1st, was a perfect day now that Winter is over.

I started at one of my usual spots and immediately picked up a very strong 1 watt signal. I couldn't pick out a direction so I switched to the 10mw frequency. This also resulted in a very strong signal coming from everywhere so I dropped down to the 1mw frequency and managed to get a bearing.

It seemed to be coming from near the shopping center across the street so I checked there first. I didn't find anything so drove across route 68 and quickly lost the signal. After a circle or two I returned to my starting point and decided to check around the building nearby. I drove across the lot, over a slight rise, and there was Bob, WB1GYZ, all set up in his foxhole.

Not only did I pick a beautiful day to return to foxhunting, I also managed to be the first to find the fox. It didn't take long for the other hunters to begin coming in. Just about everyone made it with about 45 minutes to spare. I was very lucky to have picked a spot almost on top of Bob's hiding place. Let's see if my luck holds in the future.

A Handy Fuse Tester You Can Build

Here's a simple piece of test equipment that's easy to build and use. Chances are you have all the necessary parts. If not, Radio Shack should stock all of them. You'll wonder how you ever got along without it.


My eyes are not what they used to be. I often come across small "buss" fuses that are no longer in their package. Reading the markings on these small fuses is getting tougher and tougher. I'd have to drag out the magnifying glass and bright light to read the value. "There has to be a better way," I thought. The schematic below is my solution.

I use a regulated 13.8V power supply. If you wish to use something different, just adjust the value of the resistors ac-cording to Ohm's Law. R1 is a $1K\Omega$ resistor. D1 is any common Light Emitting Diode. FH is a fuse holder designed for the fuse you wish to test. Note that you can put more than one holder in parallel, so that you can test different styles of fuses. SW1 is a multiple pole rotary switch. The more poles your switch has, the greater the range of values you can test for. Three are shown for clarity, but you can add as many as you like, using appropriate resistors.

R2 is a 13.8Ω resistor. Although that's not a standard value, you can easily make one using combinations of off the shelf resistors in series and parallel. Since current equals voltage divided by resistance, 1 amp will flow through R2. Similarly, R3 is a 6.9 Ω resistor, giving 2A of current. Note that because R2, R3, etc are such low values, almost all of the current will flow through them and almost none through the 1K Ω resistor. Thus the LED will not light. For R4, and as many others as you care to add, just do the math and construct the proper value of resistor.

Using the tester is simple. Start with your switch at the lowest current setting, and put the fuse to be tested in the holder. Move the switch to higher settings, one step at a time, pausing after each step. When the LED glows brightly, you'll know what value the fuse was. What could be easier? 73, John N1GNV

We Have a Sub millimeter Band?

Though not often used, we have quite a few bands above 70 cm. In fact, there are more than a dozen bands available to us and some are more than 5 GHz wide.


While working POTA activations, Shawn, KC1NQE, and I try to see how many bands we can use. 160 meters through 70 cm can be made to work without too much trouble. That leaves us pondering the rest of the bands. Generally, as the frequency moves up through UHF and beyond, it becomes increasingly difficult to build oscillators, amplifiers, and mixers.

We have not looked into using Gunnplexers, magnetrons, or masers. Instead, our plan was to jump over all the microwave bands to the almost unknown sub millimeter band. Wavelengths below 1 millimeter produce frequencies as high as the Terahertz range. That's about a million times higher frequency than what we commonly use. The technologies used in this band are very different from what we're used to and in some ways, easier to get working.

The FCC allows us access to just about all frequencies above 275 GHz. ARRL and Logbook of the World refer to this as the sub millimeter, or SUBMM band. It encompasses all of the infrared, visible light, and ultraviolet wavelengths. Fortunately, to operate here, we can employ infrared LEDs and photodiodes instead of 300 Terahertz oscillators and amplifiers.

I managed to build a pair of infrared transceivers and about ten club members have used them to make QSOs during POTA activations and during WB1GYZ's Saturday morning Morse Code class. That's one more band for us. We'll need to begin pondering some more and see if any of the other bands are within reach.

I think the SUBMM band is something of a novelty, but I'll be happy to set up the transceivers for anyone who would like to give it a try.


