


1947 -- 2022 CELEBRATING ITS 75TH ANNIVERSARY

In the past few years, a few of the MARC's elite members (well actually in age and seniority) have been sifting through a plethora of historical data from Frank Darmofalski W1FYG / W1YY/ W1FD. Before he passed away, he summoned W1KKF Bill and Rich WA1TRY to come see him at the Elim Park facilities where he entrusted them with records & data dating back to pre-WWII. Bill W1KKF knowing he was not in the best of health, appointed Rich as the Club Historian to maintain the safety of those records.

Today Rich WA1TRY along with Dave K1WJL (the most senior member (historically not age) after Bill W1KKF's passing) are assembling an historical progression of the MARC from those pre-WWII days of the old "Meriden Radio Club" which slowly migrated into the present day Meriden Amateur Radio Club.

It is important to some of us, while we understand others cant be bothered with the past, to document and remember what they did. Frank W1FD was a truly dedicated and passionate amateur radio operator as you will see and we thank him for saving the records Rich WA1TRY is another truly dedicated and passionate ham and historian. Rich has been researching old newspaper archives from the Meriden area and has come up with some interesting tidbits of Meriden's radio history such as this article from the Meriden Daily Journal dated June 14th of 1914...

Title: Meriden Boys to Become Links in Wireless Club
Friday, June 14th 1914 - Meriden Daily Journal

Did you know that the first known persons in the city of Meriden to be publically acknowledged as "radio" enthusiasts goes back to an article in the "Meriden Daily Journal" in 1914 (ON THE NEXT PAGE) when a young Laurence Southwick, living with his parents on Curtis St. Meriden, CT along with two friends joined a newly formed club in Hartford called the "Hartford Radio Club". They were one of the first (in Meriden) of 150 new Connecticut based members of the "Hartford Radio Club".


In 1912 the FCC was formed and from that time on, all "ham radio" operators had to be licensed. The new Hartford Radio Club, was formed in 1914 by **Hiram Percy Maxim**, son of Sir Hiram Maxim (inventor of the gun silencer). It's purpose was to have free wireless messages radiated through a nation wide organization of amateur operators.

One of those first radio enthusiast from Meriden to apply for membership was Laurence Southwick along with Godfrey Rockefeller, second son of William G. Rockefeller, who is the correspondent at Greenwich and is the most prominent operator admitted to membership up to date. Young Rockefeller and his brother, Stillman had been taking lessons from John Barrett, a jeweler and an expert amateur operator. There was already a good amount of "spark" communications in the city of Meriden prior to that date in 1914. And those are just a few of the first "hams" to become officially involved with newly formed "Federal Communications Commission" (1912) and later the "Hartford Radio Club" in 1914.

In case you didn't know .. "The Hartford Radio Club" within the next year, would go on to become what we now know as the ARRL.

And now you know the rest of the story. (apologies to fans of Paul Harvey)

MERIDEN BOYS TO BECOME LINKS IN WIRELESS CLUB

Laurence Southwick, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Southwick of 119 Curtis street, will make application for membership in the newly formed Hartford Radio club in which 150 amateur wireless operators in Connecticut already are enrolled. Other amateur operators in the city including Wayne Miller and Harry Hightner may apply for membership.

Hiram Percy Maxim, son of Sir Horam Maxim and the inventor of the Maxim gun silencer, is the founder of the club and the plan is to have free wireless messages radiated through a nation wide organization of amateur operators.

Godfrey Rockefeller, second son of William G. Rockefeller, who is the correspondent at Greenwich, is the most prominent operator admitted to membership up to date. Young Rockefeller has been experimenting with the wireless for a year or more. Godfrey and his brother, Stillman, started their investigations with such determination that their father offered to equip a modern station for them as soon as they justified it.

The Rockefeller boys have been taking lessons from John Barrett, a jeweler and an expert amateur operator. Godfrey's outfit is said to be one of the best in the state.

Maxim's organization is based upon the assumption that no government interference or interstate technicality will arise. There are said to be some 300,000 amateur wireless operators in the United States.

"This is one of the unanticipated developments of wireless telegraphy," said Mr. Maxim to-day, "that a man in Maine may sit in his library and talk with his friend in California, with only a few relays in between. We are trying to get the names of all the amateurs in the country. Aside from encouraging the study of scientific matters by young men, the movement may easily be of inestimable value in flood, storm or war.

"It can be no infringement of the existing telegraph or telephone companies, because messages will be handled from station to station and delivered entirely by courtesy."

Mr. Maxim talks with Buffalo, Westfield, N. Y., and places in northern Pennsylvania nearly every night. On clear nights he gets St. Louis, with only one relay at Buffalo. He plans some night to have the mayor of Hartford exchange greetings with Buffalo's mayor.

Meriden Amateur Radio Club Plans Public Inspection

Officials Invited To Visit Quarters At Dossin Beach

The Meriden Amateur Radio Club has invited city officials, communications people and the press to inspect the Dossin Beach headquarters, 7:30 o'clock, Thursday evening.

At last night's regular club meeting, it was announced invitations have gone out to Mayor Houston, Frank Sprafke, chairman of the Recreation Commission, Chief of Police Michael B. Carroll, Chief Leonard Petrucelli and Captain Charles Zimmer of the Signal Department. Other agencies interested in message handling are being contacted through Mrs. J. B. Crabtree for the Red Cross; T. Val Hedgpeth, Southern New England Telephone Co.; Stanley Killeen, Connecticut Light and Power Co., and Ernest Markham for aviation.

All city officials and persons representing agencies interested in communication will be welcomed Thursday evening. The club voted last night to open next Sunday's meeting to members' families and the public. Meetings begin at 7:30 and are ordinarily preceded by a half hour of code practice for prospective amateurs.

At the open house Thursday for officials, the club plans to initiate a message from Mayor Houston to Red Cross headquarters in Hartford, transmitting from the club's 10-meter station at Dossin Beach through W1AW, Headquarters Station of the American Radio Relay League to its destination. Officials will have the opportunity to see how the former north-wing bathhouse has been transformed into a message center and meeting place for the 29 members.

A committee headed by Lawrence Cook, and including Floyd Steiner, Emil Grieco and Stewart Stockwell, has been active since the room was made available by the city. They have stacked bathhouse racks behind partitions and fashioned a meeting hall and transmitter room in cream and brown paint. They have laid a wood floor over the concrete, painting it grey and installed two stoves.

After the business portion of last night's meeting, Emanuel Rame showed three reels of sound movies, and coffee and doughnuts have become a social feature of each regular meeting.

The Meriden Amateur Radio Club was organized in February at the Y.M.C.A. It met Sunday evenings there and later at the Rita Restaurant. Through interested city officials the present permanent quarters were made available. The club has a constitution and has posted on its bulletin board official recognition from the ARRL. Several social events were held in the summer and fall, including a picnic at Lake Quonnapaug.

The original slate of officers elected by 12 charter members in February was Frank Darmofalski, W1FYG, president; Howard Wessenberg, W1HVE, activities manager; Edward Bischert, W1NRG, treasurer, and Herbert Ellmers, W1QPD, secretary. Heyward Watts, W1RCI, replaced Mr. Wessenberg, as vice president when W1HVE moved to Newington.

Frank Darmofalski, W1FYG, W1FD (sk) who was one of the founders and first President of MARC (1947) was already filling the role as "Elmer" and teaching Morse Code and radio theory to young Meriden Boy Scouts in 1943. (Meriden Record Newspaper)

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN, FEBRUARY 2022 KEY KLIX

Hello, my name is.....

Many of us are shy, or at least we were shy, before we became amateur radio operators. Hams often have "mike fright", it is being too timid to hit the PTT button and make a contact. Many of us go through this phase but we overcome it. When we do, lo and behold, we go OnAir at will, and call CQ 20M whenever the spirit and propagational waves move us. I, too, went through this phase but now I actually like being NCS for W1NRG- Coffee Cup Net, W1YU Yale Tuesday Net, and the Thursday SkyWarn Net. Indeed, when I walked into my first MARC meeting in April 2016, at the suggestion of AB1DQ, I was quite self-conscious and frankly more than a bit intimidated. Here were all these Hams who had more knowledge about amateur radio in their finger, than I had in my whole body. I took the 3 FCC license exams and passed them in 3 months as I had limited time. At that point, I had very little knowledge of what it meant to be a Ham.

When I walked into the Cook Hill Fire House that April evening, I was painfully aware that the guys were staring at me with facial expressions ranging from "who the hell is he", to "I don't know who he is – maybe he is just looking for the bathroom". When I did muster up enough courage, I walked up to Bill W1KKF (SK) and introduced myself. He did not seem overly impressed, but he was cordial and friendly. After a meeting or two, I volunteered to chair the Activities Committee and offered to purchase a Dunestar Filter, the club needed for the upcoming Field Day. That offer moved me from sitting at the 'outer perimeter chairs', to sitting at the tables in the 'inner group'. I went from "Who the hell is he" to "Hey, Ed, how are you? – any good QSO's recently – great to see ya". They no longer had to look at my name badge to remember my call sign. I remember how much better I felt when the warmth and light of club friendship shone on my name tag. We all feel that way. No one wants to sit alone and feel left out or feel like they are invisible.

As of today 26Feb2022, we have 101 Club members with about 10-15 members still to pay dues. We also have 3 or 4 new applicants to vote in at the March Business Meeting. Since Jan 2021, due to VE sessions, Coffee Cup Nets, 6M and 10M Nets, POTAs, Fox Hunts, Zoom meetings, and many other Club activities, we have attracted a whole group (N=~40) of new members. Now, as the OEM (re)opens, as Zoom meeting participants grow and as our Club expands, we will more often see a new call sign and a new face. It is thus, CRITICAL that if you see a new ham in person or on Zoom – please go over (or get off mute) and say "Hi – I am _____ (enter your name and call sign) – welcome to MARC, how can I help you"? That SPARK – SPontaneous Acts of Radio Kindness can make the difference between a one year Club member who 'leaves' the Club after a few months and puts his/her license in a drawer, only to fall off the FCC list of active hams after 10 years, vs. a ham who is a strong active club member an adding to our growing list of welcoming and involved members.

This morning I went to the OEM and saw a group of 6-7 club members including 2 brand-new hams KC1OYM and KC1QLS, learning Morse Code from WB1GYZ, K1LYP, NZ1J, and N1AKN. KC1DOY and K1LHO were observing, too, from the next table. The joy, happiness and excitement that emitted from that group was palpable. THAT'S what amateur radio is all about. Hams helping Hams.

We will be seeing more and more new call signs and faces in the coming year(s). Please if you see someone you don't know, walk over to them, initiate a conversation, and make them feel welcome. N1BRL K1LYP, N1ZN, KE1AY, KB1JL, N1AKN, N1API and others, all do this whenever a new Ham leaves a VE session – whether the applicant passed or not. That's why we hand out welcome packets. A small SPARK goes a long way. I am proud to say our club members, do this naturally. Occasionally, however, we forget how lonely it can be sitting by yourself – not knowing anyone. We need to be alert and proactive in welcoming new members. Keep this in mind as we grow and grow. Who knows, the next club member we vote in, just may have an extra Dunestar lying around.

ARLB007 FCC: Amateur Service Licensees May Not Use Radio Equipment to Commit Criminal Acts

The FCC Enforcement Bureau has re-issued an earlier reminder that licensees in the Amateur Radio Service, as well as licensees and operators in the Personal Radio Services are prohibited from using radios in those services to commit or facilitate criminal acts. The FCC did not indicate what, if anything, prompted the renewed Enforcement Advisory or if it was just a routine announcement.

"The Bureau recognizes that these services can be used for a wide range of permitted and socially beneficial purposes, including emergency communications and speech that is protected under the First Amendment of the US Constitution," the FCC said. "Amateur and Personal Radio Services, however, may not be used to commit or facilitate crimes."

As it did in advisories in 2021, the Enforcement Bureau is reminding amateur licensees that they may not transmit, "communications intended to facilitate a criminal act" or "messages encoded for the purpose of obscuring their meaning."

"Likewise, individuals operating radios in the Personal Radio Services, a category that includes Citizens Band radios, Family Radio Service walkie-talkies, and General Mobile Radio Service, are prohibited from using those radios "in connection with any activity which is against Federal, State or local law.

"Individuals using radios in the Amateur or Personal Radio Services in this manner may be subject to severe penalties, including significant fines, seizure of the offending equipment, and, in some cases, criminal prosecution.

"To report a crime, contact your local law enforcement office or the FBI," the FCC advised.

The Return of the Fox Box

Instead of our usual 'live' fox hunt on Sunday morning, the weekend of February 19/20 Dave Tipping NZ1J placed a fox box somewhere in Wallingford using his fox box which transmitted 1 watt on 146.565MHz for 45 seconds, each time it was activated via a DTMF '1'. The fox stayed in place for 24 hours, starting at noon on Saturday. The "somewhere in Wallingford" was my home located in a quiet neighborhood near the south border with North Haven. This was a challenging fox to find. More so than usual because there was only the one 1-watt fox. There was no 10mW or 1mW transmitter to aid in homing in when one got close. The first hunter to find this box hidden in plain sight was Rob Cichon K1RCT in just under 2 hours. Shortly thereafter we had a collaborative hunter team, comprising of Eric Olsson KB1JL, Bart Toftness N1BRL, and Joe Farrell K1JCF, triumphantly arrive.

Later Saturday afternoon, our intrepid fox hunting friends Noah Ludecke N1NIS , and Derek Langlois KC1EUM succeeded finding the fox about two hours after starting. Sunday morning came and the fox box came to life once again. The hunt was on. I was crestfallen when no hunter spotted the fox and the box stayed silent. Dave retrieved the fox at noon on Sunday. This adventure was over. This was my first experience with Fox Hunting. I learned many things. I got to see what the fox box contains and what the antenna looks like. I learned how to activate it with a DTMF tone. I got to experience how long it took participants to find this fox. I saw the delight from the hunters upon completion and I can only speculate on the exasperating choice to discontinue the hunt by some unknown intrepid hunter.

The parts of the hunt I didn't observe are the hunters tools. I will need to tag along on a hunt and learn this part of the discipline or, perhaps, an expert hunter can utilize a tech net and we all can catch the fox hunting bug.



